

RV enforcement delayed until July 2007

The City of Richardson's ability to enforce an ordinance that establishes regulations for parking recreational vehicles in the City becomes effective July 1, 2007.

According to Neighborhood Services Manager Don Magner, ample notice will be given to residents leading up to this date. "Warning notices will be sent well in advance reminding residents of the July 1, 2007 enforcement date," Magner said. Residents who have questions or would like to discuss compliance options in the meantime are encouraged to contact Neighborhood Services. "Our staff is available to meet with residents at their property to discuss their unique circumstances," Magner noted.

The ordinance defines a recreational vehicle as a vehicle primarily designed as temporary living quarters for recreational camping or travel use, including a travel trailer, camping trailer, truck camper and motor home. The ordinance also applies to boats, trailers, jet skis and similar equip-

The ordinance prohibits the parking of recreational vehicles on vacant or unimproved property. It does not allow parking in the front yard between the building and the front property line or in the side yard of corner lots. This applies to the owner or tenant of the property as well as the owner or person in charge of the vehicle.

The ordinance does permit recreational vehicles to be parked in the side or rear yard if they are screened by a minimum six-foot high wooden fence; or screened by a landscaping shrub wall that is a minimum of three feet high and five gallon in size when planted (the City has an approved plant list for shrubs that will provide a continuous unbroken solid visual screen which, at maturity, will reach a height of six feet or the height of the recreational vehicle, whichever is greater).

A temporary on-street parking permit for a maximum of two weeks may be requested from the Richardson Police Department and will be issued based on evidence of need. A recreational vehicle may be temporarily parked on the property for the purpose of loading or unloading. This is limited to four occasions per year and a maximum of 72 hours per occasion. Each occasion must be separated by at least seven days. A recreational vehicle may be temporarily parked on the property of the owner four times per year for no more than seven days. Each occasion shall be deemed a seven-day continuous parking period and should be separated by at least seven days.

Local food service establishments received a certificate and a letter of congratulations from the City of Richardson Health Department in February. The letters, with an accompanying certificate suitable for display, were sent to all establishments that have maintained a high level of commitment to food safety as observed during food service inspections conducted in 2005.

Only those establishments that serve or handle food and have had no violations of 3, 4 or 5 points observed on the unannounced food service inspections qualify. Additionally, the establishment must maintain documentation of the proper food handler certification requirements for food serv-

"We are pleased to see a number of facilities have qualified for this award, now in its second year," Richardson Health Director Tom Hatfield said. "The 86 recipients should be proud of their accomplishment in maintaining high standards throughout the course of last year."

"This award recognizes those who have made a special commitment to food safety and sanitation," Assistant Health Director Elise Dixon, who oversees all food inspection activities, added. "This award offers the Health Department a tangible way to express appreciation for a sustained effort."

Pollution going down drains

Stormwater runoff, or nonpoint source pollution, has been identified as the nation's main cause of water quality problems. Any time engine fluids, grass clippings, trash or lawn chemicals enter the storm drains, either by rain flow or illegal dumping, the fish, water fowl and other aquatic animals suffer from the pollution going directly to our waterways.

The City of Richardson, as part of a regional effort of more than 30 Metroplex communities, is putting a message in the form of a round plastic marker next to storm drain inlets on the streets in your neighborhood. The marker, which states "This Drain for Rain, Flows to Creek, Don't Dump" is a reminder to you and your neighbors that nonpoint source pollution will end up in our waterways if allowed to enter the storm sewers. Unlike our home's sanitary sewers, the storm drains discharge directly to the City waterways, without treatment.

You can help prevent storm water pollution.

- Don't allow dirt, leaves, or grass clippings to accumulate on your driveway, sidewalk, or in the street. Never dump yard waste into a storm drain.
- Keep your car engine tuned to prevent oil and antifreeze from collecting on streets and parking lots. Never use the storm drain for disposing of engine fluids, lawn chemicals, paints or trash.
- Follow directions carefully when applying fertilizers and pesticides. Do not over apply. Sweep driveways and sidewalks, don't hose them off.
- Consider using a commercial car wash to clean your vehicle. Don't allow detergents, dirt and grease to wash into the storm drains.
- · Pick up pet wastes and dispose of them properly.
