

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN UPDATE UNDERWAY COMMUNITY FEEDBACK SOUGHT

As the City of Richardson begins work on the Envision Richardson Comprehensive Plan Update, feedback from the public is needed.

The purpose of a Comprehensive Plan is to describe a community's desired vision for the future. It is used to guide a city's land use and property development and provides a basis for future zoning decisions. It also helps inform decisions on public investments in transportation and other infrastructure improvements required to support future residents and businesses. The plan includes an implementation strategy for use by City staff and elected officials to help achieve the plan's goals. During the next two years, there will be plenty of opportunities to submit your feedback. The Envision

opportunities to submit your feedback. The Envision Richardson project will include three "Community Summit" public engagement periods that will last several weeks each. The first period will begin this month and go into July. The goal of this summit is to begin the visioning process for the future of Richardson.

Residents and other stakeholders will be able to provide input online, at scheduled open houses and at community events such as Richardson's 150th anniversary celebration and the Family Fourth event. Pop-up input stations at City facilities, including the Richardson Public Library and the recreation centers, have been scheduled. The online input opportunities will mirror the material at the open houses.

CITY COUNCIL, BOND ELECTION RESULTS

On May 6, Richardson residents elected the 2023-25 City Council and also approved a \$46 million bond proposal to fund a new City Hall, replacing the existing building that was damaged by fire in August 2022.

The Richardson City Council consists of the Mayor and six Council Members in two at-large seats and four place, or district seats. Though members representing Place 1 through 4 must reside in those areas, all members of the City Council are elected at-large by voters. All City Council seats carry two-year terms and are up for election during May of every odd year. Term limits for membership on the City Council are limited to six terms, or 12 consecutive years. The following votes were canvassed and made official at the May 15 City Council meeting.



WORK UNDERWAY ON TEMPORARY CITY HALL, LIBRARY

FACILITY IS LOCATED AT GREENVILLE AVENUE, PLANO ROAD

Workers at Richardson City Hall who were displaced by the August 2022 fire should be back under one roof in late summer/early fall once renovation work is complete on an east Richardson office building. The facility, located at 2360 Campbell Creek Blvd. at the southwest corner of Plano Road and Greenville Avenue, was the most move-in ready of a dozen sites that were considered.

The City is leasing about 48,000 square feet for the temporary City Hall, and another 29,000 square feet so the Library can be relocated while the existing building undergoes a full renovation beginning later this year using funds approved in the 2021 Bond Program.

Since the fire, City Hall workers have been working out of five separate city-owned facilities, with City Council meetings held at the Police Headquarters. All services provided at City Hall prior to the fire, including public meetings, will be relocated to the temporary facility.

The facility will feature a single area where the public can meet with representatives from the Health Department, Building Inspection and Water Customer Service, with a setup like what has been in place in the lobby of the Municipal Court Building since the fire. People who choose to pay their water bills in person will be able to do so at the new facility.

The Library move should happen in the fall following the opening of the temporary City Hall. The Library's entire collection is being relocated, with space also designated for children's activities, meetings and computer usage.

While the building was the most move-in ready, some renovation work must take place before employees can move in. This work includes bringing the City's fiber network into the building and making minor modifications to the interior space to fit the needs of the various departments.

City Hall staff will be at the temporary facility until a new City Hall building is constructed using funds from the 2023 City Hall Bond Program. Planning work for that facility is underway, with a public survey and open house meetings scheduled to begin later this month. The Library will be at the temporary facility until the existing facility is renovated. That work is expected to be complete in fall/winter 2025.















Minor modifications to the interior of the building are expected to be completed in late summer/early fall.



SIDEWALK REPAIRS AND ADA RAMP CONSTRUCTION UNDERWAY

WORK WILL COMPLY WITH NEWEST STANDARDS

Construction crews are moving through several regions within the City to repair sidewalks as part of the 2021 Bond Program. Construction crews will update sidewalks and curb ramps in five sub-regions, in both residential and commercial areas, within Richardson as shown in the map (pictured to the right).

All sidewalk repair needs within the funded region are prioritized based on how damaged the panels are or the severity of vertical separation between panels (1" or greater) that create a tripping hazard.



Fixing these qualifying sidewalk defects or issues will improve travel for pedestrians and improve accessibility. Unlike previous sidewalk repair projects, it is not necessary to be "on the list" to get sidewalk maintenance assistance. All qualifying repairs will be marked at the time of construction.

Curb Replacement

Curb (corner) ramp replacement is underway to meet the current Public Rights of Way Accessibility Guidelines (PROWAG), which also meets the Americans with Disability Act (ADA) accessibility standards and Texas Accessibility Standards.


NOT PROWAG-Compliant


The previous standard, which is known as a diagonal ramp (pictured right) directs pedestrians into the intersection rather than along a straight path through the intersection. This has the potentional to disorient visually impaired users and requires additional maneuvering for those using wheelchairs.

PROWAG-Compliant

The new compliant ramp (pictured right), known as a combination directional ramp, guides users along an uninterrupted path. This reduces the potentional for visually impaired users to be disoriented and unnecessary maneuvering for wheelchair users. This allows vehicles within the road to anticipate the pedestrian's direction of travel when entering the roadway.










Non compliant Diagonal Ramps

As Richardson celebrates its 150th

anniversary in 2023, it is important to

look back at where the city came from.

From its founding in 1873 as a small

railroad town to its current-day status

as a city that is home to businesses

and institutions that help develop the

LOCAL RESIDENTS PREMEMBER THE

PAST

TALES OF PIZZA VILLA AND CRUISING ON BELT LINE

it was like to be here as the Space Race was transforming Richardson from a small farming community to a technology leader.

"Pizza Villa wasn't that big, but we crammed in there every Sunday night," Walton said of the beloved pizza place, which operated from 1960-2013 at the southeast corner of US 75 and Belt Line. "It was good pizza and everybody loved it. Pizza was kind of a new thing. No one had ever heard of pizza down here since we weren't from New York."

Texas Instruments opened a facility in Dallas on the Richardson border in 1958, and Collins Radio opened a facility in Richardson that same year. With the Space Race in full swing, workers moved to Richardson in droves, with Richardson's population growing from 1,289 residents in 1950, to 16,810 in 1960, 52,807 by 1970 and 72,342 in 1980.

Chuck Bukin was one of the people who moved to Richardson at that time. An Aerographer's Mate who was responsible for launching two weather balloons per day onboard the aircraft carrier USS Wasp during the Korean War, Bukin joined Texas Instruments after leaving the service and moved to Richardson in 1962. At TI, Bukin was a manufacturing and processing senior engineer and worked in the manufacturing of semiconductors.

"I remember there being nothing but cotton fields north of Arapaho,"



Sun Rexall Drugs, which had a 50-foot-tall sign.

Bukin said. "There was a big traffic circle at Belt Line and Coit. Belt Line was two lanes, and Arapaho was two lanes and had ditches on each side of it. The places to go eat were the Golden Eagle Restaurant and Fred's BBQ. Man, they were good."

Jack Kanz moved to Richardson in 1961 and worked as a technician in a research division at TI before going to law school and starting his own law firm. Kanz knew of Richardson before moving here, as he played on the 1953 and 1954 Clifton High School football teams that defeated Richardson High School in the Class A (the smallest classification in Texas high school sports) playoffs.

"When TI bought this property, everything started moving to Richardson. It started in the late 1950s and seems to have never stopped since then," Kanz said. "I think the police department had two people when I started here. I do remember their patrol car was a 1955 Ford."

The one business each of the long-time residents spoke highly of was Sun Rexall Drugs, the iconic pharmacy with the 50-foot-tall sign that opened in 1958 and operated for 47 years at the corner of Belt Line Road and Central Expressway in the Heights Shopping Center.

"For those of us who grew up here, you would find out what your school supplies were because Mr. Kaplan would post the list in the window," said Denise White, a 1977 Richardson High School graduate who grew up in Richardson. "It had everything you

could imagine in there. They had a lunch counter, a soda fountain and a talking mynah bird. All the kids loved going there."

In the mid-1970s, high schoolers like White hung out at a few different places including swimming pools in the summer, the Thunderbird Roller Rink and a restaurant called Next Door, where you placed your order on a phone at the table and then picked your food up at the counter. Next Door was in the Promenade Shopping Center.


"Once everybody got to driving, people would meet up in the parking lot of the A&P Grocery Store at Belt Line and Coit," she said. The two main strips everyone would cruise were Coit and Belt Line. In those days, you knew every car that drove by because it was only the teens who were out; the adults were all at home." Carol Bowling and Hannah McDonald moved to Richardson in 1964 and 1968 respectively. One of the main reasons each of them relocated to Richardson was the quality of the schools. While Richardson still has excellent schools, the women said pretty much everything else has changed.

"When we moved here there was a farm right behind Mohawk Elementary where you could go buy fresh eggs," McDonald said. "Where did all these people come from?"

Bowling agreed, adding the change came suddenly.

"I think things changed overnight," Bowling said. "It was like we blinked and the area was completely built up." While the Richardson of the 1960s is barely recognizable today, one remnant of the past remains just off Main Street in Downtown Richardson. Del's Charcoal Burgers has been at 110 S. McKinney St. since 1957. The menu today is largely unchanged from those early days, serving hamburgers, hot dogs and homemade root beer.

"Del's, Pizza Villa and Sun Rexall Drug are three places that if you don't know them, then you didn't grow up in Richardson," White said. "Del's was one of the only places you could get a burger. You would get them in a brown paper bag and bring them home. It has changed hands, but it is still family owned and they still make that homemade root beer."







Upon completion of the program, participants will gain a better understanding and knowledge of the structure and function of Richardson's municipal government.



SMOKE TESTING BEGINS THIS MONTH

UNDERGROUND PIPES TESTED FOR CRACKS

Where there's smoke doesn't mean there's fire during the City of Richardson's planned smoke testing this summer. The Engineering and Capital Projects Department is continuing its annual smoke testing of the City's sewer lines with testing scheduled to begin in the Rowlett Creek Basin on June 5 and last through mid-July, weather permitting.

The City began its multiyear, citywide examination of approximately 2.16 million linear feet of sewer pipe, or more than 400 miles of sewer line, in 2017. Examination of about 1.85 million linear feet of sewer pipe has been completed to date. The city is divided into six separate drainage basins for sewer collection: Floyd Branch, Duck Creek, Cottonwood Creek, Prairie Creek, Spring Creek and Rowlett Creek, with testing in all but the Rowlett Creek Basin being complete.

Testing determines the state of underground pipes that carry wastewater out of homes and businesses and ultimately into area wastewater treatment plants. When infrastructure ages, cracks in sewer pipes can let rainwater seep in, overloading their capacity and pushing too much wastewater at a time into treatment plants.

Smoke testing is a proven method in which technicians utilize a smoke generator to blow nontoxic, residuefree smoke into manholes. The smoke travels through the sewer pipes and finds its way out, lightly billowing from the ground when cracks in the underground piping exist. The coordinates of damaged pipes are noted to be addressed in future projects.

While the testing is done for city infrastructure, the smoke may make its way out of house sewer vents. If a home sink or bathtub drain has not been used recently, there is a chance smoke will emit from it. Residents are encouraged to run water into seldom-used drains prior to the test. Other smoke that leaks into a house is a likely sign of plumbing problems within the structure and should be addressed by a licensed plumber. Although the presence of smoke can activate a smoke alarm, it does not create a fire hazard.

Testing is weather permitting; results are measured when the ground is not saturated. The City is working with contracting company RJN Group to complete the testing, which takes around an hour for each partial street block section. Residents in testing areas should watch for door hangers about two days prior to testing making them aware of the process on their street. Contractors may work near properties, but will not ask for access to residences or businesses.

HOME WATCH PROGRAM FREE SERVICE OFFERS PEACE OF MIND WHILE ON VACATION

If you're planning a summer vacation, you can opt into a free program to ensure that your home is safe while away.

The Richardson Police Department encourages Richardson residents to utilize the House Watch Program to help prevent criminal opportunity. When a resident signs up, trained Volunteers in Police Service will check on their home for up to four weeks, as time permits.

"The House Watch program, conducted by our Volunteers in Police Service, gives each resident a little extra peace of mind," Police Chief Gary Tittle said. "Having the VIPS stop and check a residence is a proactive measure for us to help reduce the criminal opportunity, while also mitigating any observed problems by quickly notifying the homeowner. This is just another opportunity for partnerships between the

community and the Richardson Police Department."

The House Watch Program is not available to homes that are vacant (have no one usually residing there). Homes that are entered by pet sitters or other persons watching the home during the homeowner's absence also do not qualify for the program.

OF STREETS AND WATERWAYS

As temperatures heat up and "outdoor living" areas and landscapes get prepared for summer, the Health Department wants to remind homeowners/renters to keep our water system's health in mind when prepping pools and greenery.

- Don't over-fertilize and over-water lawns, which washes the excess fertilizer (and your money) into our streets and storm drain system, which drain to area creeks; the fertilizer causes algae to build up to unhealthy levels in the creeks. To receive free, customized watering guidelines each week, visit www.watermyyard.org.
- Pool chemicals can also be harmful to our creeks, hurting aquatic life and compromising our water system, which is why the City of Richardson's code of ordinances specifically prohibits the discharge of pool filter backwash (or any kind of pool drainage) into streets, alleyways or other city right-of-way. 
