Representatives of three businesses, two schools and five residences were honored during the 2002 Revitalization award ceremony held in December.

McDonald's at 120 S. Central Expwy. received the newly created Pioneer Award for its architectural design, signage and incorporation of existing trees into the new landscape design.

Two businesses and five residences received Excellence Awards. First Bank of Canyon Creek's Drive-thru facility at 429 Belle Grove was cited for its dramatic building design and landscaping.

The Super Target store at Richardson Square Mall received an award for its reuse of the old Montgomery Ward site. The building is accented with decorative pilasters and cornices and significant landscaping has been provided.

The Henderson residence at 2210 Prairie Creek Drive East received an award for features added during a remodeling, including a large, covered porch, new doors and windows and new landscaping beds.

The Hoyt residence at 1309 Dumont Drive was cited for a "Hill Country style" renovation with a large covered porch with a stone base and heavy timber framing. Stone retaining walls create terraced landscape areas adjacent to the creek.

The Master residence at 1805 Provincetown Lane was recognized for a thorough exterior update of the home including painting, installation of new windows, doors and shutters, new siding and doors on the detached garage

and significant landscape upgrades and enhancements.

The Taylor residence at 910 Beechwood Drive received an award for a complete exterior renovation, including a new porch featuring slate pavers and gaslight fixtures.

The new Weidenfeller residence at 401 Fall Creek Drive also received an award. The original home was constructed in the late 1960s and was in need of extensive repairs and updating. The family chose to replace the original home with a new one, which features extensive use of stone veneer and cast stone and a two-story entry turret. Mature trees in the yard were preserved during reconstruction.

In the new Public Sector category, the Richardson Independent School District received awards for Richardson Heights Elementary at 101 N. Floyd and Richardson Terrace Elementary at 300 N. Dorothy. In addition to complete interior renovations funded by the 2001 school bond program, the grounds of both schools have been upgraded in recent years in cooperation with the schools' PTAs.

City officials have been awarding revitalization honors for the past eight years. More than 75 home and business owners have been recognized for their efforts to significantly enhance their properties, thereby enhancing the City as a whole.
